

### **Hibernians Increase Their Endowment**

The Ancient Order of Hibernians and its Ladies Auxiliary recently increased their endowment to the Cushwa Center. At their annual meeting in San Antonio the Hibernians turned over to the University of Notre Dame a check for \$35,000. The Hibernian Endowment will support activities of the Cushwa Center related to the study of the Irish in the United States. In addition to this endowment for the Cushwa Center, the Hibernians have also established a student scholarship program at Notre Dame.

## Center Receives Lilly Grant for Theological Education Study

The Cushwa Center for the Study of American Catholicism has received a three-year grant from the Lilly Endowment, Inc. of Indianapolis to support the research and writing of a general history of Catholic theological education in the United States. The Cushwa Center had received a planning grant from the Endowment for the 1981-1982 academic year to investigate the feasibility of such a study. The grant is part of a larger historical study of interdenominational seminary education in the United States, being sponsored by Lilly's.

The principal investigator for the three-year project is Joseph M. White, Assistant Faculty Fellow, Department of History, University of Notre Dame. Dr. White will research the history of theological education at selected seminaries training diocesan priests, diocesan archives, and other repositories, especially the Archives and Library at the University of Notre Dame and the Catholic University of America.

Jay P. Dolan, Director of the Cushwa Center, and Philip Gleason, Professor of History, University of Notre Dame, are the principal consultants for the project. As in the planning phase, a board of advisors will assist the project. The board consists of: Rev. M. Edmund Hussey, Professor of Theology, Mount Saint Mary's Seminary of the West, Cincinnati; Christa Klein, Associate Professor, Church History, Lutheran Theological Seminary, Gettysburg, PA; Glenn T. Miller, Associate Professor, Church History, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, NC; Rev. Thomas F. O'Meara, OP, Professor of Theology, University of Notre Dame; and, Rev. R. Stafford Poole, CM, President-Rector, St. John's Seminary, Camarillo, CA; Professors Klein and Miller participated in the research and writing of the general history of Protestant theological education.

## November Conference: "Perspectives on American Catholicism"

The Cushwa Center for the Study of American Catholicism will host a conference entitled "Perspectives on American Catholicism" to be held November 19 and 20, 1982 at the Center for Continuing Education, University of Notre Dame. Conference sessions will focus on Catholic literary figures, comparative studies of Catholics and Lutherans, Catholic education, new approaches to American Catholic studies, and women religious. ### **ACHA Membership Appeal**

Professor Martin J. Havran of the University of Virginia and this year's President of the American Catholic Historical Association recently appealed to the heads of history departments at Catholic colleges to urge their colleagues to join the Association.

According to Professor Havran, the American Catholic Historical Association is among the older learned societies, dating back to 1919, before the founding of numerous special, field-oriented societies. As a broad-based society, the Association deserves much greater support than it has received in view of the importance of its journal, <u>Catholic Historical Review</u>, its two annual meetings, and its publications' prizes. Professor Havran also cited the fact that, although faculties at Catholic institutions have faithfully supported the Association, there are many historians at these institutions who are not members. #### Province Archives Center

The Province Archives Center of the Indiana Province of the Congregation of the Holy Cross has recently completed the arrangement of several important collections of personal papers of priests of the Congregation of the Holy Cross. The completed collections include the papers of Rev. William Corby, CSC (1833-1897), Civil War chaplain, twice president of the University of Notre Dame, and Provincial of the Indiana Province three times, and Rev. John A. Zahm, CSC (1851-1921), scientist, Provincial (1898-1906), university administrator, author, and international traveler. The Archives have prepared a calendar with a brief synopsis of each letter as a finding aid. The Province Archives Center continues the work of arranging the papers of Revs. Edward F. Sorin and Alexis Granger of the Congregation of the Holy Cross.

### **Research Travel Grants**

The Charles and Margaret Hall Cushwa Center for the Study of American Catholicism has established a new research grant program. ### **Publication Prize Established**

Universal Press Syndicate and Andrews and McMeel, its book publishing subsidiary, have recently established the Jim Andrews Communicator Award for the best booklength manuscript in the area of contemporary journalism, both print and television. The annual award will inaugurate the Contemporary Media Series of Andrews and McMeel and will carry a \$15,000 award consisting of a \$10,000 advance against royalties and \$5,000 in guaranteed advertising for the book, to be published by Andrews and McMeel.

The criteria for the award are that (a) the book should be on a topic in communication, (b) the subject should be topical and appropriate for general trade book publication, and (c) the book should be written by a working journalist (print or television). Among the many topics that might appropriately fit such an award include ethical issues facing journalism and the American Catholic Church and the press. ### **American Catholic Studies Seminar**

To commemorate the 150th anniversary of the death of Charles Carroll of Carrollton, Professor Ronald Hoffman of the University of Maryland, College Park, presented a paper, "A Worthy Heir: The Role of Family and Religion in the Formation of Charles Carroll of Carollton, 1737-1774," on October 14, 1982 at the University of Notre Dame. This was the only session of the seminar series during the fall semester.



### **Publications**

David J. Alvarez published "American Recognition of the Papal States: A Reconsideration," Records of the American Catholic Historical Society of Philadelphia, 91 (March-December 1980), 49-57.

John Tracy Ellis and Robert Trisco have produced a second revised and enlarged edition of A Guide to American Catholic History, the most complete bibliography of American Catholicism available today. The Guide can be ordered from Marketing Services/ABC-Clio/Riviera Campus, 2040 A.P.S., Box 4397/ Santa Barbara, CA 93103. The price is \$29.85 plus \$1.75 postage and handling.

Rev. William B. Faherty, SJ of St. Louis University has written a history of the Visitation Sisters in the St. Louis Archdiocese covering their 150-year history in Kaskaskia, Illinois and in St. Louis. The volume is scheduled for publication in the late fall 1982.

The Federation of the Sisters of Saint Joseph in the United States has published an inventory of the Federation Archives, which are located at St. Joseph Convent, Brentwood, New York. The Federation, organized in 1966, includes 23 independent congregations in this country and two provincialates of European congregations. The inventory was prepared by Federation Archivist, Sister Margaret Quinn, CSJ.

Freedom of Religion in America, presenting highlights of a conference sponsored by the Center for the Study of the American Experience, Annenberg School of Communications, University of Southern California, has been published by Transaction Books of Rutgers University. The volume contains major addresses by Henry Steele Commager, Robert Bellah, and Kenneth Briggs as well as a series of historical perspectives by church historians.

A Guide to the Archives of the Archdiocese of Boston has recently been published by Garland Publishing Company of New York. The price is \$50.00. More than three years in the making, this 375-page hard-cover volume describes the entire archival holdings of the Boston see from 1789 to the present. Randall M. Women Religious History Sources: A Guide to Archives and Manuscript Collections in the United States, edited by Sister Evangeline Thomas, CSJ, will be published in March 1983 by R. R. Rowker Publishers.

The <u>U.S. Catholic Historian</u>, Vol. II, No. 2 (Winter 1982) contains a collection of papers presented by four Sisters of Saint Joseph at the Seneca Falls Women's History Conference, June 16, 1979. These panelists used the Archives of the five congregations of Sisters of Saint Joseph in New York reflecting on their contributions to New Yorkers for 125 years, 1854-1979.

Msgr. Francis J. Weber, Archivist of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, has edited Mission of the Passes: A Documentary of Santa Ines. The volume costs \$16.00 and is available at Dawson's Book Shop in Los Angeles.

Carr Elizabeth Worland completed a doctoral dissertation at Saint Louis University this year entitled, "American Catholic Women and the Church to 1920."

Pentecostal Catholics: Power, Charisma, and Order in a Religious Movement by Meredith B. McGuire has been published by Temple University Press.

European Immigrants and the Catholic Church in Connecticut, 1870-1920 by Sister Dolores Liptak will be published shortly by the Center for Migration Studies, Staten Island, New York.

Msgr. Wilfrid Paradis, Archivist of the Diocese of Manchester, is working on a history of the Catholic Church in New Hampshire.


<u>Timothy Walch</u> of the National Archives and Records Service is working on a brief, general history of Catholic parochial education in the United States due for publication in 1984.

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
